- **1.** (a) Differentiate $\frac{1}{x^2}$ from first principles. [6]
 - (b) The function f is defined on the domain $\left(0, \frac{\pi}{2}\right)$ by

$$f(x) = (\sec x)^x.$$

Obtain an expression for f'(x), simplifying your answer.

2. (a) Find an expression in its simplest form for

$$\sum_{r=1}^{n} r(r+3).$$

- (b) Given that the sum of the first n terms of another series is n(n + 3), obtain an expression for the nth term of the series. [3]
- 3. Consider the following equations.

$$x + 2y + 4z = 3,$$

 $x - y + 2z = 4,$
 $4x - y + 10z = k.$

Given that the equations are consistent,

- (a) find the value of k, [5]
- (b) determine the general solution of the equations.
- **4.** The complex number z is given by

$$z = \frac{1+2i}{1-i}.$$

Find the modulus and the argument of z.

5. The roots of the cubic equation

$$x^3 + 2x^2 + 2x + 3 = 0$$

are denoted by α , β , γ .

(a) Find the cubic equation whose roots are $\beta \gamma$, $\gamma \alpha$, $\alpha \beta$.

(b) Show that

$$\alpha^2 + \beta^2 + \gamma^2 = 0.$$

Deduce the number of real roots of the cubic equation

$$x^3 + 2x^2 + 2x + 3 = 0$$

justifying your answer.

6. The matrix A is given by

$$\mathbf{A} = \begin{bmatrix} \lambda & 2 & 3 \\ -1 & 1 & 1 \\ 2 & \lambda & 2 \end{bmatrix}.$$

(a) Find the values of λ for which **A** is singular.

- (b) Given that $\lambda = -1$,
 - (i) find the adjugate matrix of **A**,
 - (ii) find the inverse of A.

- 7. The transformation T in the plane consists of a clockwise rotation through 90° about the origin, followed by a translation in which the point (x, y) is transformed to the point (x + 1, y + 2), followed by a reflection in the y-axis.
 - (a) Show that the matrix representing *T* is

$$\begin{bmatrix} 0 & -1 & -1 \\ -1 & 0 & 2 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}.$$

(b) Find the equation of the image under T of the line y = 2x + 1.

8. Using mathematical induction, prove that

$$\sum_{r=1}^{n} (r \times 2^{r-1}) = 1 + 2^{n} (n-1),$$

for all positive integers n.

9. The complex numbers z and w are represented, respectively, by points P(x, y) and Q(u, v) in Argand diagrams and

$$w = z(z-1)$$
.

(a) Obtain expressions for u and v in terms of x and y.

(b) The point P moves along the line x + y = 0. Find the equation of the locus of Q. [5]
